



Ted Hunt Takes Hog Show Prize

Grand championship honors in the 13th annual State Ton Litter Hog Show held at the Stock Yards here yesterday went to a purebred Berkshire litter owned by Warren Holsapple and Sons, Orleans, which also placed first in the lightweight class for litters averaging under 225 pounds. The 1,620-pound litter of eight sold at auction to Stark & Wetzels, Indianapolis, for \$80.00 a hundred pounds, a record price for the show.

More than 500 farmers and their families attended the event, which drew 50 entries from 20 counties. It was the second largest show ever staged.

Ted Hunt, R. 2, Lafayette, won reserve championship honors with his Berkshire-Duroc crossbred litter. This litter, which totaled 1,975 pounds, sold at \$41.00 a hundred to S. & W., Frankfort. Top market price at Indianapolis yesterday was \$25.25 a hundred. Most of the show litters sold above this figure.

Winners of five hams donated by local packers for spectator-judges went to Estel L. Callahan, New Augusta; Acord Cantwell, Indianapolis; Paul E. Joye, Greenfield; Gerald Stafford, Tipton; and Forrest Averitt, Twelve Mile. Honorable men-

tion went to E. L. Burroff, Oxford. A total of 108 persons competed.

A rotating trophy donated by the Belt Railroad and Stock Yards company was presented to the Holsapples in addition to \$100 first prize money in their division. A total of \$350 in premiums was distributed to the top ten contestants in each class.

Other prize litters in the lightweight class were shown by the following: 2, Lacy Snedegar, Knightstown; 3, Snedegar; 4, L. O. Norris and John Green, Rushville; 5, Russell Norris, Rushville; 6, Neal Clapp, Manilla; 7, Mildred Vannice, Crawfordsville; 8, A. D. Webster, Crawfordsville; 9, Maurice Redelman, Greensburg; and 10, Neal Clapp. Thirty-four litters were entered in this class.

In the heavyweight division, prizes went to the following producers: 2, Degler and Londerman, New Augusta; 3, Neal Clapp; 4, William P. Davis, Columbus; 5, Billy Joe Rivers, Waveland; 6, L. O. Norris and Green; 7, Frank Bridges, Bainbridge; 8, Russell Norris; 9, and 10, Redelman. Sixteen litters were shown in this division.

Reserve Champion Won By Hunt

Ted Hunt, R. R. 2, Lafayette, won first prize heavy-weight litter and reserve champion litter. He had a litter of eight pigs farrowed and all raised. They were from a Duroc sow and a Berkshire boar. These eight pigs were farrowed Feb. 11 and at less than six and a half months averaged almost 250 pounds each.

Ted is a 4-H member, is the son of Herschel Hunt, professor of chemistry at Purdue University. Ted said that his father was very much interested in the pigs too.

The pigs were full-fed but not self-fed. For the first part of the feeding period they were fed ground oats which was replaced by ground wheat later. They were also fed ground oats, ground corn and tankage at the start. Later they were fed soaked corn and had buttermilk all season. The pigs were smooth, well-finished and very uniform.
