High Honor Given Tippecanoe Youth

Following the showing of Hereford cattle at the Indiana state fair, Maurice "Bud" Hunt, of Tippecanoe county, was selected as the most outstanding 4-H club boy in Indiana who had fed and exhibited Hereford cattle the past year. Bud, a graduate of West Lafayette high school with the class of 1948, is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Herschel Hunt of Lafayette R. 2. He will enter Purdue this fall.

Bud exhibited three Hereford steers and a Hereford heifer in the Tippecanoe county 4-H show this year, winning first prize in both Hereford steer classes, the western steer class, and champion in the Hereford heifer class. In the championship showings one of his steers was Hereford champion, and regrand champion of the show. One of the steers was sold in the county sale and two steers and a heifer were taken to the state fair. Each animal was first in its class in the state 4-H show. Also one of the steers was champion Hereford and reserve grand champion of the state 4-H show.

For being chosen outstanding Hereford 4-H boy in Indiana, Bud was awarded a registered Hereford heifer by the Indiana Hereford Breeders' association. The heifer was selected as the outstanding individual by A.D. Weber of Manhattan, Kan., judge of the state Hereford show, from a large number offered by Indiana Hereford breeders. She was bred and owned by Shadeland farms, Lafayette R. 8.

Hunt, West Lafayette, Ind., became the proud owner of a purebred Hereford heifer at the Indiana State Fair, Indianapolis, last month as a reward for his outstanding work in showing Herefords the past year. The heifer, SF Miss Elation 27th from the Shadeland Farms herd, Lafayette, Ind., was presented by the Indiana Hereford Breeders' Association with President Luther S. Ferguson making the award. Virgil Binford, manager of Shadeland Farms, added breeding privileges to one of the establishment's herd sires.

The award was made by the association to "Bud" as the 4-H boy who, in its estimation, had made the most distinctive contribution among Indiana 4-H boys to the Hereford breed. Bud, whose father is a chemistry professor at Purdue University, Lafayette, had the reserve grand champion steer in both the 4-H and Gold Medal classes at this year's fair as well as winning several other prizes and the preceding month showing the grand champion steer at Indiana's Tippecanoe County Fair

The Hunt family lives on a 30-acre farm northwest of Lafayette, where the son already has a small herd of registered Herefords including eight females and several calves. It is Bud's serious desire to take a veterinary course in college. He was highly pleased with his new heifer, valued at \$500, and immediately began discussing plans for her care with Paul Lamb, herdsman at Shadeland Farms.
